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Why Use Commodities?

- ☞ Economics
 - \$\$\$\$
- ☞ Considerable savings on feed costs



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Considerations

- ☞ 24-ton loads
 - Adequate turn-around
- ☞ Storage facility
 - Off-times
 - 14-foot eave height
 - 12-foot minimum width
- ☞ Proximity to production



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Digestible Fiber Sources

- ☞ Soybean hulls
- ☞ Corn gluten feed
- ☞ Wheat midds
- ☞ Peanut skins
- ☞ Citrus pulp
- ☞ Brewer's grains



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Soybean hulls

- ☞ Non-starch, high in digestible fiber
- ☞ Extremely effective supplement when fed at <1% of body weight
- ☞ Bloat potential at high levels
- ☞ 11 to 12% CP



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Corn Gluten Feed

- ☞ >18%, as much as 24% CP
- ☞ Drying temperature is critical
 - Produced wet (40 to 50% water) then dried and pelleted



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Wheat Midds

- ☞ Fine meal with low bulk density
- ☞ 17 to 18% CP
- ☞ 73 to 80% TDN
- ☞ Some founder potential



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Peanut Skins

- ☞ Very low bulk density
- ☞ 18 to 20% fat
- ☞ 18 to 20% CP
- ☞ Physical properties (fluffy)



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Citrus Pulp

- ☞ Good for brood cows
- ☞ Slow adapting by young calves
- ☞ 6 to 7% CP
- ☞ Seasonal

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Brewer's grains

- ☞ 20 to 25% dry matter
- ☞ 70% TDN
- ☞ 25 to 30% CP
- ☞ Extremely palatable
- ☞ Storage/shelf life problems

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Whole oilseeds

- ☞ Cottonseed
- ☞ Soybeans
- ☞ Peanuts

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Cottonseed

- ☞ 24% CP
- ☞ 20% fat
 - Fat is the limiting factor; no more than 8% total fat in the diet
 - Generally 20% of total diet is maximum

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Whole Soybeans

- ☞ 20% fat and 42% CP
- ☞ Need to be ground
 - Physical problems
- ☞ Contain urease
 - Do not feed in combination with urea-containing feeds

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Others

- ☞ Grain screenings
 - 65 to 70% TDN
 - Weed seeds/mycotoxins
- ☞ Bread/pastries
 - 90% TDN
 - 10 to 15% CP
 - 68 to 90% DM



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Others

- ☞ Candy
 - 90% TDN
 - <6% CP
 - Some high in fat (28%)
